
King County Elections website https://kingcounty.gov/depts/elections/for-candidates.aspx. The key filing dates for 2023 are:

Each Spring, when the sun comes out, blood donations drop during school breaks and families taking vacations together, but there's still a need for blood. Consider sharing a little sunshine with patients near you by making blood donation part of your spring break plans. When you donate with Blood-

works, you're giving a critical boost to patients undergoing surgeries, traumas, and cancer treatments. As a donor, you are also encouraging our local community to step up and donate blood every 56 days, rain or shine.

Bloodworks Northwest is the sole provider of blood to more than 95% of hospitals in the Pacific Northwest. It takes 1,000 donors a day to maintain a safe and reliable blood supply and I hope you will consider donating.




<u>Black Diamond Labor Days</u> – Black Diamond Labor Days planning is underway. This year's theme is "Everyone Matters in Black

Before You Cut Down Trees, Just a Friendly Reminder

The Black Diamond Municipal Code regulates tree preservation and removal. Call the Community Development Department <u>before</u> you cut trees on your property to make sure you don't need a tree removal permit!

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT NEWS

<u>Stormwater Education - Free Soil Testing</u>



With all the gloom, snow, and rain we've been experiencing this winter, many of us are getting anxious to get out into our yards to plant gardens, grass, and other plants. A big part of having a successful garden or having plants thrive is knowing what we can add to our soil to encourage that growth. Of course, dirt isn't always the same wherever you are. Even within Black Diamond, there are different soil types and we need to adapt our approach to be successful.

Did you know King County residents have a free resource that can be used to help you determine what types of fertilizer to use for whatever you're trying to grow? Well, now you do. The King Conservation District (KCD) has a Soil Nu-

trient Testing Program that provides up to five free basic soil nutrient tests for residents within the KCD service area, which includes Black Diamond. Additional soil tests can be ordered for \$25 each.

More information, including how to submit your soil sample, can be found on the KCD website here: https://kingcd.org/programs/better-soils/healthy-soil/. After submitting your soil samples, along with details about what you are trying to grow, KCD will analyze your soil and prepare a detailed report showing what you would need to add to your soil for a particular planting and what nutrients to avoid. It will help you calculate how much fertilizer you will need based on square footage, and the type of fertilizer. If the report shows you have plenty of

phosphorus in your soil but not enough nitrogen, you will be able to get a fertilizer that will help you take advantage of what you already have in your soil.



As an added bonus, having the right type of fertilizer protects our lakes and streams. Having high concentrations of these nutrients can be damaging to our waterways. This service provided by the KCD (which is funded by your property taxes) is a great way to help you find the right balance for your yard and for protecting our waterways.

Best of luck with your yard projects but taking advantage of this soil testing might help minimize the amount of luck you'll actually need. Happy planting!



Don't Flush Wipes

The Public Works Department is reminding everyone to not flush wipes of any kind down the toilet. Wipes clog pipes, jam pumps, and can lead to sewer spills and backups. We understand disinfectant wipes are being used more to protect us from diseases, but wipes should never be flushed down the toilet.

All wipes, including disinfectant wipes, "flushable" wipes, baby wipes, etc. all belong in the garbage, not the toilet. Toilet paper and human waste are the only things that should be flushed down the toilet.

Even wipes labeled as "flushable" do not readily dissolve in water like toilet paper. They can get stuck in bends of pipe (including in your home) and can cling to grease buildup, which can cause clogs and unnecessary backups and/or spills. These wipes can also jam sewer pumping facilities located around the city, causing other unnecessary backups. When the pumps get clogged with wipes, the Public Works crew has to remove the pumps in order to remove the wipes.

Please help out the Public Works Department by throwing away all wipes. We would like to make sure that sewage only moves away from your house and not back into it.


forward to his new chapter.

FLOCK SAFETY CAMERAS

The City of Black Diamond will soon be testing out automated license plate reader cameras. We'd like to share with our citizens why we feel this is a great crime prevention tool. Our goal is to reduce crime, protect property, increase public safety, and ultimately serve our victims of crime.



HOW THEY WORK:

Similar to popular doorbell cameras or toll cameras, Flock Safety's LPR system is motion-activated, meaning that it snaps a photo of passing vehicles when it detects movement. However, instead of focusing on specific homes or businesses like a doorbell camera does, the Flock camera is pointed at the roadway, where it can detect and take photos of vehicles. Flock cameras are specially designed to identify vehicle characteristics and license plates. The camera only captures the back of the vehicle.

WHAT THIS DOESN'T DO:

- * The cameras do NOT take photos of the driver or passengers in the vehicle. They are designed to photograph the rear of the vehicle.
- * The cameras do NOT check the license plate through the department of licensing records. The software simply matches the plate with up-to-date state and federal information, as well as Amber Alerts, Silver Alerts, and Missing Endangered Person Alerts.

- * The cameras do NOT record traffic violations such as speeding or running red lights. The information recorded is not used to pursue unpaid fines or citations.
- * The cameras take still photos only. They do NOT track the vehicle, or record names, addresses or phone numbers. The system does not mark specific locations of where people have been.
- * Data captured by Flock cameras is never shared or sold to third parties. The information recorded by the cameras is fully encrypted and stored in the cloud. The data is only retained for 30 days.

WHY THIS IS IMPORTANT:

Upwards of 70% of crime is committed with a vehicle. A clear, accurate photo of the vehicle and license plate is information that could be vital when solving crimes. It's important to understand that the LPRs are used for only for investigative leads of criminal offenses. The LPRs are not set up to capture images, such as a pedestrian walking on a sidewalk. The LPRs are not traffic cameras and do not capture traffic violations.

As our city continues to grow, we want to keep Black Diamond safe. This is a tool that will allow us to better protect our city.



VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITY

As summer quickly approaches, the Black Diamond Police Department is once again looking for qualified individuals who want to assist the marine patrol unit. Join our team and help keep our lake one of the safest to recreate.

MINIMUM QUALIFICATIONS:

- At least eighteen (18) years of age.
- Have a clear background check and no felony convictions.
- Have not been released or discharged from any branch of the Armed Forces under any conditions other than honorable
- Have on file a completed, processed volunteer application.
- All marine volunteers will have a signed waiver from their physician that they are in good health and able to perform volunteer duties.
- Good moral character.
- Possess a valid WA driver's license.
- Pass a drug test provided by the police department.
- Ability to successfully obtain the Washington State Boater's Education card.
- Marine volunteers will receive no benefits, remuneration, or entitlements including sick leave, etc. However, the marine
 volunteers are covered by the City of Black Diamond's insurance and workers compensation for injuries received while
 acting in the capacity of a marine volunteer.
- Agree to volunteer a minimum of (16) hours per month during the summer months. If a member has a valid excuse, the time requirement may be waived by the Black Diamond Police Department supervisor.
- Successfully complete marine training as required by the Black Diamond Police Department.
