

<u>City Offices</u> – I want to remind citizens that City offices are open to the public by appointment only. Customer service remains a top priority so please reach out to staff to schedule an appointment should you need

assistance (360) 851-4500. If you are not comfortable with coming into the office, we remain committed to assisting you as best we can by phone or electronically.

Economic Hardship Assistance – ARPA Funding – For those who may experiencing an economic hardship the City has received ARPA funding and a portion of those funds has been allocated for rent and utility assistance. Once again, the City has partnered with the Black Diamond Community Center to administer funds to residents experiencing an economic hardship. **2022 Operating Budget** - On November 2, I will be presenting to Council the 2022 Preliminary Budget. Staff and I have been busy working on this since July and my focus is to present a fiscally responsible budget that is responsive to the needs of the city. This is a very challenging balancing act and one I do not take lightly. We must

# FINANCE DEPARTMENT

All City departments have been busy preparing the City's annual operating budget for 2022. The Operating Budget funds services associated with public safety, public works, parks, planning, permitting and other municipal services.

The budget tells the City's financial story and sets spending targets for the programs and services that city residents receive. During August and September the Finance Department updated 2022 revenue forecasts for the General Fund and other funds using 2021 trends, growth projections and forecast information provided by Municipal Research and Services Center and other agencies.

An update on 2022 budgeted revenue and expenditure trends was reviewed with Council at a work study on September 30th. A summary of proposed 2022 budget totals for all city funds was also presented. Other work studies are scheduled for Council on October 21st and 28th in the Council Chambers.

Public hearings are scheduled for November 4th, 18th and 30th. Public input is always welcomed and encouraged. # **Stormwater Education – Fertilizers**

As many of us prepare our yards for the winter, we may look to find the best fertilizer and lawn treatments to get our yards through the winter and ready for the spring. As you look to purchase fertilizers, you may notice the bags have numbers on the front, something like: 10-20-10. What does that even mean? It's not a math problem (but if it was, the answer would be negative 20).

Actually, these number represent percentages by weight in the bag. The first number is the percentage of available nitrogen (N), the middle number is phosphorus (P), and last is potassium (K). So a 50 pound bag of fertilizer with 10-20-10 on the front would be made up of 5 pounds of nitrogen, 10 pounds of phosphorus, and 5 pounds of potassium (10% of 50 pounds each). The remaining 30 pounds would be filler (usually sand and/or granular limestone).

So now we know what the numbers mean, but what does that mean for our yard and the environment? All three elements have their benefits. Nitrogen helps with plant growth and leaf development; phosphorus helps with root of






fruit, seeds, and flowers; and potassium aids root development and helps plants resist drought and disease. Of course, if we do more than is needed, we cause more harm than good to our yard. Consequently, too much can affect the surrounding environment. We hear a lot about phosphorus here in Black Diamond and the negative impact it has on waterways (where there's algae, there's usually too much phosphorus). If we do what we can to prevent these nutrients from leaching out from our yards, we can help protect our waterways.

This leads to the question, how much of each nutrient do I need for my yard? The King Conservation District has a soil testing program which allows each resident in the District Service Area (which includes Black Diamond) to receive five free basic soil nutrient tests (<a href="http://kingcd.org/programs-farm-management-soil-testing.htm">http://kingcd.org/programs-farm-management-soil-testing.htm</a>). The District will provide a report specific to your yard detailing the nutrients that are in the ground and amendments you may need to make to your soil to enrich it and balance out the pH levels (pH means potential hydrogen). The report will also give suggestions as to how you can offset nutrients your yard may have too much of. As you use this report, you can look at the numbers on the fertilizer bags to determine how much of each nutrient you actually need, which will help your yard, the surrounding environment, and your budget as you only buy what you need. And as always, be sure to read the directions on the package before applying any fertilizers or chemicals.




# POLICE DEPARTMENT NEWS
