ABOUT THE AUDIT

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the City of Black Diamond from January 1, 2011 through December 31, 2012.

We evaluated internal controls and performed audit procedures on the activities of the City. We also determined whether the City complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of noncompliance, misappropriation or misuse. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Capital contributions
- Conflict of interest/ethics laws
- Hotline/citizen concern

- General disbursements
- Payroll

RESULTS

In the areas we examined, the City's internal controls were adequate to safeguard public assets. The City also complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures in the areas we examined.

ABOUT THE CITY

The City of Black Diamond, incorporated in 1959, is classified as a noncharter code city located in King County. The City provides its approximately 4,160 residents with police, fire, water, sewer, public works, cemetery and municipal court services.

An elected, five-member Council and an independently elected Mayor govern the City. The Council appoints management to oversee the City's daily operations as well as its approximately 50 employees. For fiscal years 2011 and 2012, the City reported expenditures of \$7.6 million and \$7.4 million, respectively.
