- Reflect the community's values on water quality and inform how and where future actions are implemented



Stormwater Management Action Planning (SMAP) Process




What's Next?

- Focused drainage system inspections and maintenance in high-priority basins
- Possible changes to land development policies and codes
- Potential stormwater management projects in your neighborhood

The City operates under a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit developed and administered by the Washington State Department of Ecology. This permit outlines how we manage stormwater in the city to keep local receiving waters clean. These receiving waters include Covington Creek and Green River. The permit also requires the City to plan for future development through a new project called the Stormwater Management Action Plan (SMAP).

The SMAP Process

- Identify the watersheds in the City of Black Diamond (see map below).
- · Assess the condition of our natural water bodies.
- Identify which drainage basins have the highest needs.
- Develop and implement long-range water quality and watershed protection policies, strategies and actions to improve the water quality of the highest priority watershed(s).
